How was last season?

The Blues were one of the pre-season favourites having invested heavily in their squad but got off to a terrible start, winning just once in their opening six games of the season and sat bottom of the league at the end of September. Results improved quickly and they soon found themselves in the top half of the table, yet never really challenged at the top of the table. The reached their highest league position, 7th in January after a 5-1 win against Kingstonian, but four consecutive defeats saw them drop back to mid-table where they never recovered from.

New manager Gary McCann has heaps of experience at Step 2 and 3 and has built a strong squad for this season, with the Blues once again one of the pre-season favourites.

When did we last meet Billericay Town?

The two games against The Blues last season yielded just one point for the Rooks but it could have easily been six. In the first meeting in September, with the returning

Michael Klass making his debut, again. Alas, Klass saw red in the 73rd minute by which time the Rooks were chasing the game. John Ufuah gave the hosts the lead in the 11th minute, and when Chris Dickson raced clear to

score a second in the 52nd minute it looked game over. But the Rooks stormed back. Joe Taylor pulled one back in the 58th minute then had a perfectly good effort chalked off for offside. Then Ayo Olukoga on a rare foray into the opposing penalty area saw his goal disallowed for a handball that the referee managed to see from 50 yards away.

In the return match in February, Joe Taylor gave the Rooks a 36th minute lead but a fantastic effort from Kareem Isiaka on the hour saw the visitors leave with a point.

About New Lodge

A lot has changed in recent years at New Lodge and it is one of the best grounds at Step 3 anywhere in the country today. The problematic pitch has been replaced by a decent 3G surface, with the slope from corner to corner removed. Both ends had very similar looking covered terraces installed, whilst a new all seated stand called the Harry Parker Stand was erected on the clubhouse side of the stadium. This smart looking covered stand is around half the length of the pitch in size and runs from the halfway line down towards the Blunts Wall Road End.

Opposite is the Family Stand. Although only four rows high, this all seated stand is covered and runs the full length of the pitch.

Another unusual feature is that within the perimeter of the ground, in one corner, near the stadium entrance is a large tree which overlooks the stadium. Outside the ground, the rear of the Harry Parker Stand is covered with an impressive row of large murals, one of the reminders of the Glenn Tamplin ownership era.

How to get to New Lodge

From Lewes - A27/A23/M23 and then head anti-clockwise on M25 through the Dartford Tunnel. Leave the M25 at the junction with the A12 (J28) and take the A1023 through

Brentwood. When you get to Shenfield take the A129 towards Billericay. Alternatively on leaving the M25 continue down the A12 towards Chelmsford until you reach the next exit (Mountnessing). At the roundabout take the first exit (turn left) then take the first right (just after the scrap yard). Continue along this route until you reach a mini roundabout. Turn left, then you are on the road into Billericay. Note there is a height restriction of 13'3" on this route. Both of these routes will bring you into Billericay on the same route. On entering Billericay turn right at the first set of traffic lights (near the Texaco Garage). Blunts Wall Lane is a little way along on the right. Parking is down this road and into the cricket club which is the next entrance passed the ground.

By Rail - Billericay is located on the Liverpool Street - Southend Victoria line; trains run approximately every 20 minutes on most days. Billericay Town Football Club is approximately 25 minute's walk from the station. On leaving the station turn right into Radford Way. At the top of the road turn right, crossing the railway line by the footbridge. Then turn right again at the bottom of the High Street into Western Road. Walk the full length of Western Road, then cross over at the traffic lights into Tye Common Road. Blunts Wall Lane is a little way along on the right. Note Mayflower taxis are located just outside the station and will transport you to the ground for a modest fee.

Admission at New Lodge

Admission this season is £12 for adults, £7 for concessions (senior citizens and students), Under17s £5 and accompanied under 11s £1.

Fancy a beer?

There's a decent sized bar at New Lodge but if you fancy a beer on the way to the ground then check out the Billericay Brewing Company in Chapel Street which offers a range of their beers brewed on site plus guest beers. The Red Lion on the High Street is on the walk from the station to the ground and has a range of cask ales.



How was last season?

After a great start to the season which saw the Rocks top the table after a 6-1 win at Aveley in the third game of the season, it was ultimately a disappointing season, never looking like challenging the top third of the table from November, whilst never really looking in danger of relegation. Scoring was never the issue with young striker Nathan Odokonyero scoring 31 times, but at the other end they conceded 72 goals, including conceding four or more on five occasions. The highlight of the season was the run to the Sussex Senior Cup Final which included wins over Eastbourne Borough and Brighton & Hove Albion Under21s.

When did we last meet Bognor Regis Town?

We met the Rocks three times last season, starting with an enthralling FA Trophy tie in November. The Rooks went 2-0 up in the first 12 minutes only to end up drawing 2-2. Young on loan keeper Toby Steward was the hero, saving two spot kicks to see Bognor through 4-2 on penalties.

On the 2nd January, Lewes won 3-1 in front of nearly 1,300. Early goals from Joe Taylor and

Ryan Gondoh gave the Rooks the advantage but that man Odokonyero pulled one back before Taylor put the game to bed in the 90th minute.

At Easter, Lewes dominated the game, with Gondoh scoring twice in the opening 10 minutes. Whilst the Rooks had Deon Moore sent off a few minutes later, Joe Taylor scored twice more in a 4-1 win.

About Nyewood Lane

Nyewood Lane is a picturesque ground that has a modern feel to it. One end is overlooked by 'Seasons", the clubhouse and has a covered terrace in front. Opposite is the roofed terrace, at the Sports Club End, which has an electric scoreboard on its roof. On the north side of the ground is another covered terrace, being a few steps high, which runs for around half the length of the pitch. On the other side is new, impressive covered seated.

How to get to Nyewood Lane

From Lewes head west on the A27 all the way to the Fontwell Roundabout and take the A29, the second exit, passing the racecourse on your right-hand side. Continue to follow the A29 towards Bognor Regis town centre, passing over numerous roundabouts until you get to South Bersted and the roundabout where the B2259 intersects. Take the fourth exit and then the third left into Hawthorn Road. After ½ mile just after passing the Co-Op on your right-hand side, take a left into Nyewood Lane and the ground is 200 yards on the right-hand side. Journey time around an hour from Lewes (38 miles).

There is ample on-street parking in Nyewood Lane and surrounding roads. There is also free

parking available within the Bognor Sports Club, via the entrance in Hawthorn Road. There is a turnstile giving access into the ground from this car park and you will also find a bar within the Sports Club which you are very welcome to use.

If coming by train (approx. 90 minutes and at least one change at Brighton), either take a taxi (approx. cost £4.50) or if walking, turn right out of Bognor Regis station and walk along Linden Road until you reach Parklands Avenue, where there is a footpath on your left (opposite Town Cross Avenue) that leads all the way to the entrance of the football club – should take around 15 minutes to walk.

Admission at Nyewood Lane

Admission this season is £13 for adults, £10 for concessions (senior citizens and students), Under18s £5 and accompanied under16s free of charge. There's a £1 charge to sit in the Main Stand.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is The Wheatsheaf, which is a pub-restaurant chain, on Hawthorn Lane, about five minutes away from the ground. The pub of choice in the past for the Lewes fans has been the Wetherspoons outlet, the Hatters Inn on the corner of Queensway and West Street. Close by in the High Street is the Rocks Bar which has a decent selection of beer.

How was last season?

Along with Aveley, Canvey Island showed there was nothing to it, adapting to life in a higher division as they came mightily close to back to back promotions, ironically losing out in their Play-Off semi-final at home to Aveley.

Whilst the season started steadily, if unspectacularly, it was Canvey's relentlessness after Christmas that saw them the form team for weeks on end, spending the last third of the season in the play-off spots. Twenty four goals from Evans Kouassi and twenty three from Bradley Sachs certainly helped but it was their team work that saw them win seven successive games coming into the final furlong and upsetting the form book.

This season will be a test for Brad Wellman and his relatively unique diamond formation. Some key players have moved on and the standard of the league will have shifted a gear, so the question for Canvey fans is whether Wellman can keep up with the pace of change.

Alas, results elsewhere meant the Play-off dream ended, as we fell short by just 2 goals.

About The Movie Starr Stadium

It's not just the ground name that has changed significantly in recent years. The club demolished the old club house and have built a cracking new venue for the club and its fans. The rest of the ground is as it was, and quite frankly, didn't really need much changing. Yes, the wind blows off the Thames Estuary but the view, well the view from the excellent steep terrace at the north end of the stadium is one of the best in Non-League football. Perfect for watching the game and the massive container ships and cruise liners passing by. Opposite the club house are two narrow covered terrace areas which are the haunt of the home fans, and they use the low roof to make quite a din. Be warned, cash is king here and attempting to pay with a rectangle piece of plastic will see you frown upon at best, keel hauled at worst.

How to get to The Movie Starr Stadium

Head to the M25 and then take anti-clockwise route towards Dartford Crossing. Exit M25 at Junction 30 and take the A13 towards

Southend. You will reach a series of mini roundabouts. At these roundabouts, take the A130 towards Canvey Island. At the next roundabout take the 2nd exit which will keep a sports centre on your right and follow signs for Canvey Island Football Club. Eventually, you will enter a one way system. Keep left through the one way system and after one mile you will pass the Transport Museum on your right. Park Lane is on the right hand side shortly afterwards, with The Prospects Stadium located in front of you. There is plenty of parking outside the ground.

Benfleet Station is 40 minutes from London Fenchurch Street and 50 minutes from London Liverpool Street on the C2C line. The station is 5 miles from the ground. There is a taxi rank around the back of the station. Alternatively, you can use the frequent bus service from the front of the station - the number 22 or 27 buses drop you directly outside Park Lane. Alternatively, you can use the number 21 or 21A to be dropped by the sea wall. From here, continue walking in the direction you travelled across some playing fields, and you will see The Prospects Stadium on your left.

Admission at The Movie Starr Stadium

Admission is £12 for Adults, £7 for Concessions and £2 for accompanied under 16s.

Fancy a beer?

There's not much in the way of good pubs around the ground. The Hoy & Helmet and The Half Crown are next to Benfleet Station, whilst the Lobster Smack on the island has some interesting history but nowhere near the ground. Probably best to stick to the excellent clubhouse at the ground.



When did we last meet Carshalton Athletic?

After reversing the trend of single goal defeats to the Robins in previous seasons, it was a case of a win a piece last season. The Rooks claimed all three points on a sunny August day at the Pan thanks to a double from Deon Moore, deputising for the injured Joe Taylor.

In the return fixture on a chilly January night the Robins won 2-1. It was a drab affair for the first seventy minutes before the game came to life after Jamie Mascoll was judged to have fouled his man.

Tom Beere gave them the lead in the 73rd minute from the spot, only for Joe Taylor to equalise ten minutes later with a superbly hit half-volley from the edge of the box.

But almost straight from kick-off Beere hit an unstoppable volley from 35 yards to give Carshalton all three points.

About The War Memorial Sports Ground

The War Memorial Sports Ground is one of the best grounds in the Isthmian League. The ground started life as plain old Shorts Farm back in the 1920's and the first part to be developed was the grandstand, originally bought and transported piece by piece from Epsom Racecourse down the road. In 1968, gale-force winds battered this stand so much that it had to be demolished. Today the main feature is the huge, covered terrace that runs down the side of the pitch, allowing ample room for thousands of fans even if it is more likely today to only house a few dozen.

In addition, the ground boasts a good sized, if small in length, grandstand and plenty of standing room down the side of the pitch. Behind the north end is a small cover whilst at the south end the cover extends across the full length of the terrace. The bar is spacious with big screen TVs that often show games that have more appeal than the game going on outside. The club claim to serve the "Best Burger in English Football" from the new eatery in the corner of the pitch, next door to the club shop, both allowing you to watch the action whilst waiting to be served. Spoiler alert...it isn't.

How to get to The War Memorial Sports Ground

Carshalton is not the easiest place to get to from anywhere else apart from South London by car especially if you have to travel through Croydon which can be blocked by shoppers on a Saturday, and commuters in midweek. If you are coming from the south via the M25 then take exit 7 signposted Croydon and follow the A23 past the old Croydon airport before taking a left after a few miles onto the A232.

Follow this road for a couple of miles, passing Beddington Park on your right before you

enter Carshalton. Pass through the High Street, passing the two large ponds on your right and take the next right into West Street. Pass the Racecourse and Hope pubs on this road and then immediately after you pass under the railway bridge take a left into Colston Avenue. The entrance to the ground is down a small alley about 150 yards on your right. This is a busy and narrow road, so I would avoid parking down here – there is a car park at the ground behind the stand, although on our last visit some cars were broken into during the game or park on West Street or Colston Avenue. Journey time for the 48-mile trip is just over an hour.

Carshalton is in Zone 5. The station is only a few minutes' walk from the ground – take a right out of the exit and walk down the hill. Turn right, walk under the railway bridge and then left into Colston Avenue – ground is 150 yards on your right. Journey time from Lewes is 1 hour 50 mins if going via Victoria or 20 minutes less if you change at East Croydon and Mitcham Junction. Off-Peak returns cost around £20.

Admission at The War Memorial Sports Ground

Admission last season is £11 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens and students), and accompanied under 18s are £5.

Fancy a beer?

Whilst relatively small in size, Carshalton has a few decent pubs within a stone's throw of the ground. On West Street (take a left out of the station) there is the Greyhound and The Hope which is certainly a favourite with the Lewes travelling support thanks to a superb range of beer and excellent pork pies, whilst in The High Street there is the Woodman, Coach and Horses and Fox and Hounds – all of which are worth a visit. There is a decent sized bar at the ground and beer can be taken outside whilst the game is on.

How was last season?

After winning the two horse race in 2021/22 with Sheppey United to secure the South Eastern Counties Premier League title and return to the Isthmian League, Chatham continued that winning form and earned back to back promotions after holding off a challenge from Ramsgate.

They started the season well, going unbeaten until mid-November, thanks to goals from Jack Evans who ended the season with 24 in all competitions. They suffered a little wobble in March, losing top spot to Ramsgate but second consecutive wins to end the season saw that secure the championship with a game to spare.

Whilst the step up to the Isthmian Premier will be a challenge, Chatham have the infrastructure to ensure that they won't suffer the heartache of relegation any time soon.

When did we last meet Chatham Town?

We last met Chatham Town in the Ryman League South in the 2016/17 season under Darren Freeman. After a Lloyd Dawes double gave us a comfortable home win in August, we visited Chatham on the last day of the season. Whilst the Rooks had nothing to play for, Chatham needed a win, and results elsewhere to go their way to stay up. Alas, in a turgid game, it ended 0-0 in front of just 143 fans and relegation beckoned for the home side.

About The Bauvill Ground

Few Lewes fans will recognise the Bauvill Ground since our last visit back in May 2017. A huge investment has been made in the facilities, and the benefits are now being reaped on the pitch after two back to back promotions and average attendances up tenfold in just five seasons. The ground is used 7 days a week, with the 3G booked solid by local schools, clubs and Chatham's own academy. Facilities at the Town end have been improved, with an impressive, if incredibly steep terrace. Next to this the bar area is as it was but has an outdoor patio area.

The main stand is still in place, complete with new seating although it is a fair way back from the pitch and the first few rows suffer by people walking backwards and forwards. There's a couple of small stands behind the dugouts but most of the remaining capacity is hard standing around the pitch. Aside from the bar there's a food outlet by the corner flag.

How to get to The Bauvill Ground Exit the M2 at junction 3 and follow directions for Chatham & Town Centre. You will then pass a Homebase & Toys 'R' Us on the left hand side. Continue straight over the roundabout and then there is a split in the road, where you should bear right into Maidstone Road. Follow this, continuing

straight over the cross roads and you will see a petrol station on the left. Bournville Road is opposite the petrol station on the left. Ground entrance is first left. There is a decent size car park at the ground, alternatively it is street parking. Journey time for the 73 mile trip is around 1 hour 20 minutes.

If you are coming by train then you will more than likely come via London Victoria. It is easy to find although it is a fair walk uphill from the station. Turn right on leaving the station and right again onto Maidstone Road. Continue to walk uphill for fifteen minutes, then once you have passed the cemetery on your left, take the next left for the ground. Journey time is around the 2 hour mark.

Admission at The Bauvill Ground

Admission this season is £12 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens, students and Under18s), and accompanied under 16s are £3.

Fancy a beer?

Chatham isn't known for its decent football pubs so it may be better to jump off the train one step earlier in Rochester where there are only 17 drinking establishments along the mile-long High Street heading west from the station. There are very few drinking establishments near the ground. The Prince of Wales in Railway Street is probably a good bet if you are coming to or from Chatham station.

Razz Coleman De-Graft opened the scoring in the 52nd minute before Ken Charles equalised with 13 minutes to play.

Joe Taylor looked to have given us all 3 points with his 84th minute goal but an 88th minute equaliser from Reece Beckles-Richards gave both sides a share of the points.

About The Cheshunt Stadium

Whilst the club owners have ambitious plans for the ground, converting into a residential/leisure hub built around the football pitch, they are still some way away from realising the dream. Facilities are adequate for Step 3 but there's nothing that stands out about the ground.

There's a few small stands dotted around the ground, the biggest of which straddles the half way line on the club house side of the ground. On the opposite side is an old, seated stand, which is out of bounds.

How to get to The Cheshunt Stadium

From the M25 motorway exit at Junction 25 taking the A10 (Great Cambridge Road) north following signs for Hertford. At the first roundabout take the third exit following signs for Cheshunt/Waltham Cross A121 (Winston Churchill Way). At the next roundabout take the first exit following signs for Cheshunt

B176 (High Street). Continue under the Railway Bridge and turn left at the next mini roundabout into Theobalds Lane. Cheshunt Stadium is 800 yards on the right hand side. The ground has a car park with spaces for 200+ vehicles.

Theobalds Grove Station is a five minute walk away on the corner of the High Street and Theobalds Lane and enjoys a half hourly service to & from Seven Sisters (Victoria Line) and Liverpool Street. Please note that Cheshunt Station is not the nearest station to the ground although train services from Liverpool Street are quicker, it is a thirty minute walk/ £10 taxi ride.

Admission at The Cheshunt Stadium

Admission this season is £14 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens, students and Under18s), and accompanied under 16s are £1.

Fancy a beer?

Cheshunt isn't blessed with many pubs – in fact you can count them on one hand, with three fingers tied together. The Vine on Winston Churchill Way is marginally better than the Wetherspoon's offering, The Moon and Cross. Maybe a better option is to have a beer in London before jumping on the train to Theobalds Grove.



About The Aspect Arena

Despite their recent spell in the National League South, there's not much changed about the ground since we last visited ten years ago. On one side is a small Main Stand, which runs for around half the length of the pitch, sitting astride the half way line. On either side of this stand are two small additional covered seating areas, that look temporary in nature and almost 'bolted on' to either end of the Main Stand. They are both quite small having 50 seats each. Opposite on the Caravan Park side of the stadium, it is mostly open with just a flat walkway running down behind the pitch perimeter. Also on this side of the ground are two very small temporary seated stands, that are covered and also contain 50 seats each.

At the South End of the ground there isn't a terrace as such but a small flat standing area behind the goal that has had a small covered erected, which has a number of supporting pillars. The North End or Clubhouse End is slightly better, having a small, covered terrace located behind the goal.

How to get to The Aspect Arena

Head to the M25 and then take anti-clockwise route towards Dartford Crossing. Exit M25 at Junction 30 and take the A13 towards Southend. You will reach a series of mini

roundabouts. At these roundabouts, take the A130 towards Canvey Island. After you pass Canvey Island Infant School on your right you will then reach a mini roundabout where you turn right into Thorney Bay Road. Then take the third right into Thames Road. The ground is further down this road on the left. There is a fair sized car park at the ground, or street parking on the road running alongside the ground.

The nearest railway station is Benfleet which is located just under three miles away from the ground. Benfleet station is served by trains from London Fenchurch Street. There is a taxi rank outside the station. It will cost around £10 to the ground. Alternatively First Bus run regular services from Benfleet Railway Station to Canvey Island. Bort services Number 21 (from Bus Stop A) and Number 27 (From Bus Stop C) go along Thorney Bay Road, which is at the top of Thames Road for the ground.

Admission at The Aspect Arena

Admission is £12 for Adults, £7 for Concessions and £3 for accompanied under 16s.

Fancy a beer?

There's not much in the way of any, let alone good pubs around the ground. The historic Lobster Smack, as featured in one of Charles Dickens books is on the sea front about a ten minute walk away, other than that the Beach Bar at the ground will tick a couple of boxes.

How was last season?

About Hayes Lane

Cray Wanderers will still be calling Bromley's Hayes Lane home for a few more season whilst their new ground at Flamingo Park in Sidcup is built. Not that they are suffering too much at Hayes Lane as the Conference National side has invested heavily in the ground in recent years including the construction of the new stand behind the goal which wouldn't look out of the place in the Football League and contains the impressive Broomfields bar and food concessions. At the far end covered terracing remains. At one side is the modern looking John Fiorini (Main) Stand. This covered all seated stand doesn't have any supporting pillars and sits astride the half way line whilst opposite is a decent sized, quite steep terrace. One of the better grounds we visit on our travels that's for sure.

How to get to Hayes Lane

Exit the M25 at Junction 4 and take the A21 towards Bromley and London. After five miles

for left at the traffic lights onto the A232 towards Croydon/Sutton. At the 2nd set of traffic lights turn right into Baston Road (B265). Continue straight on this road through Hayes. The road becomes Hayes Lane and after the mini roundabout the entrance to the ground is down on the right. There is a small car park at the ground, otherwise street parking. Total travel time from Lewes for the 53-mile trip from Lewes is around an hour and twenty minutes.

The ground is a fifteen-minute walk from Bromley South station (not North which is miles away!), frequently served by trains from London Victoria which is in zone 5. Simply head right out of the station, cross the road and walk down Westmoreland Road, taking the first left into Hayes Road and following this all the way down to Hayes Lane where the ground is opposite you. Journey time is around 90 minutes. Alternatively, a number of buses run past the ground including the 314 from Eltham, 146 from Bromley Town centre and 119 from East Croydon which takes around the same time as the train but obviously much cheaper.

Admission at Hayes Lane

Admission last season was £12 for adults, £6 for concessions (senior citizens, students and Under18s), and accompanied under 16s are £2.

Fancy a beer?

Bromley town centre is a fifteen-minute walk away and has plenty of drinking establishments for all tastes. Opposite Bromley South Station is the popular Richmal Crompton pub, whilst The Tigers Head on the walk towards the ground is a good bet. For craft beer fans, the Star and Garter in the Old High Street is recommended.

About Champion Hill Stadium

Champion Hill ground is largely open and has mostly flat standing areas on three sides, with just a small portion (a few steps high) of terracing towards the rear. Both the East and West ends are uncovered, as well as most of the Southside, although this does have a small portion of cover and terrace located at its centre.

However, the Tommy Jover Main Stand on the other side is quite a posh looking affair, even though it has been built onto the front of an office building. This all seated stand is elevated, meaning that you have to climb a small set of stairs to enter it. Once there you are rewarded with excellent views of the pitch as there are no supporting pillars to contend with. There is a glassed area visible to the back of this covered stand that contains the Social Club.

There's plenty of food and drink on offer, with the club in partnership with Brick Brewery.

How to get to Champion Hill Stadium

Head north on the A23 then M23. At the end of the M23 take the A23 towards Croydon. Continue along the A23 towards Central London through Croydon and then Streatham. On reaching the junction with the South Circular A205 turn right towards Dulwich. After passing Dulwich Park on your left, turn left onto Lordship Lane (A2216) towards East

Dulwich. Go through East Dulwich and go straight on when you come to a roundabout. You will pass East Dulwich station on your left. And then just past the small park on your left turn left into Sainsbury's. The ground is located to the left of the store. There is a small car park at the ground, otherwise street parking. You can book a parking space in Sainsbury's in advance.

The nearest stations are East Dulwich, which is a five minute walk; or Denmark Hill; which is a ten minute stroll, or a short bus ride.

From East Dulwich station: Turn left, past the pizza shop and then Morley's. Go through the park at the bottom of the hill and you will see the ground. For midweek games, when the gates are closed, walk halfway up the hill and turn left at the lights.

From Denmark Hill station: Turn left, this is Champion Park. You will see a bus stop opposite the Salvation Army Training College. Any bus from here passes the ground, three stops away. Or walk past the bus stop, turn right and up the slight incline on the main road. Over the lights at the top of Dog Kennel Hill, and the ground will be on your right, halfway down the hill, turning into Edgar Kail Way.

Admission at Champion Hill Stadium

Admission last season was £12 for adults, £5 for concessions (senior citizens and students), Under13s free when accompanied by a paying adult.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is the Cherry Tree, which is at the bottom of the hill, near East Dulwich Station. Further around the corner is the East Dulwich Tavern which is also recommended.



About The Queen Elizabeth Stadium

The stand out feature of the Queen Elizabeth Stadium is the main stand which for all you art and architecture aficionados is a Grade II listed building, designed in 1939 and completed in 1953. The bar at the top of the stand offers some panoramic views of the game, albeit from a distance away. There's a few rows of seats up here too.

There is a small, raised terrace halfway between the main stand and the edge of the pitch, whilst behind each goal are small, covered terraces which allow fans to generate a decent noise. On the far side is a small-seated stand that straddles the half-way line. The ground hosted a number of games in the 2018 CONIFA World Cup including the final in front of a record attendance of over 2,000 fans, although for the play-off game in April 2022 against Hornchurch there were almost 2,000 crammed in the ground.

How to get to The Queen Elizabeth Stadium

The ground is relatively easy to find if you are coming down from the M25, Junction 25 which means you need to head up the A3/M23 then anti-clockwise around the M25 (it's a 10 mile shorter trip than going clockwise but if the Dartford Crossing is bad it could be an option) to Junction 25. Take a left at the roundabout and head south on the A10. Follow the A10 towards Central London for around 1.8 miles and then take a right into Carterhatch Lane, then first left into Donkey Lane. The ground is around the corner.

There's plenty of free parking opposite the entrance.

The 93-mile journey from Lewes should take around 1 hour 45 minutes depending on the traffic and time of day.

There are two train stations close to the ground. Southbury is a 30-minute journey from London Liverpool Street. Exit the station and then take a left onto Southbury Road. At the junction with the A10 use the pedestrian crossing to cross and then take a right and head north up the A10. At the end of the playing fields there is an alley on the left — take this and the ground is ahead on the right.

Enfield Town is on another line from London Liverpool Street and is a 33-minute journey time. Exit the station and turn right along Southbury Road. After you have passed Tesco on your right, cross the road and take next left into Ladysmith Road. Follow this road for 500 yards before taking a right down the path where the ground is at the end.

Admission at The Queen Elizabeth Stadium Admission last season was £12 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens and students), Under16s £1 plus there is a £1 charge to

transfer to the seats in the main stand.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is the Toby Carvery on the A10/Donkey Lane junction but you can do better than that! The Cricketers on Chase Side does some good ales on draft and is a 20-minute walk from the ground. The Kings Head is in Market Place and is recommended. It is almost next door to the Barclays Bank which had the first ATM machine in the UK (even better random fact, Reg Varney from On the Buses fame was the first customer to use the machine). There's also a decent bar at the top of the main stand in the ground which services rotating craft beers.

About The Alcaline Stadium

Without a doubt, one of the best Non-League grounds...depending on when you visit. The steep open terrace at the Cricket Ground end offers superb views of the North Downs and Kent countryside, perfect for the early or late season game. In the winter it offers little respite from the driving wind and rain. At the far end is a great six-step terrace with a low roof that allows you to generate a great atmosphere.

The hardcore Invicta fans stand on a terrace behind the dugouts, which also has the Aladdin's Cave of a programme and memorabilia shop — worth the admission fee on its own. On the same side in the corner is the changing room block that also has a bar upstairs. On the entrance side is the main bar and one of the best cafes around, with an imaginative menu and cooked fresh to order. The area in front is paved and has seats so you don't miss any of the action whilst waiting.

The 400 seat Brain Merryman Stand, aka The Grandad's Stand probably offers the worst views in the ground, and that's a bit harsh but just shows how good it is elsewhere to watch the game and the countryside.

How to get to The Alcaline Stadium

It's a fair old trek down to Folkestone Invicta but it is certainly worth the journey. Head up the A23/M23 then anti-clockwise on the M25. At junction 5 stay on the road as it becomes the M26. This will then become the M20 and you need to stay on this until junction 13, then head south onto the A20 (Cherry Garden Avenue). At the traffic lights, turn left onto the A2034 (Cheriton Road), pass the Harvey Grammar School and Stripes club – the ground is next left before Morrisons' supermarket, opposite the cemetery. Some car parking is available at the ground, with street parking around Cherry Garden Avenue your alternative option. Journey time for the 100-mile trip is around an hour and a half assuming the traffic is good.

There is an alternative route cross-country for those averse to the British motorway system that involves following slow-moving vehicles down country lanes which is 40 miles shorter but may take around the same time.

If you are coming by rail then disembark at Folkestone West (Folkestone Central is about same distance from ground). On leaving the station follow Station Road right and take left onto Beachborough Road, then right onto Cheriton Road. The ground is visible on the left-hand side of the road, immediately after the Harvey Grammar School. It is around a 2-hour slog by train, either up to London Victoria and then out again or via Hampden Park and Ashford International.

Admission at The Alcaline Stadium

Admission last season was £12 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens and students), Under18s £3 and accompanied under 5s are admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

There's very few pubs within walking distance of the ground, although there is the Park Inn Hotel opposite Folkestone Central. However, get into the town centre early and head down to the harbour-side for some excellent offerings on The Stade including The Royal George, The Ship Inn and The Mariner.

About Coles Park

The ground is slowly being developed by the ambitious owners, including the installation of a 3G pitch, but it is still a one-sided affair with the main stand which can seat around 300 straddling the half-way line and offering good views of the game, whilst just to the side of this stand is a covered terrace. Apart from that it is hard standing on the three other sides with very little in the way of shade. There is a decent sized clubhouse behind the main stand and some excellent food options from a pop-up stand in between the main stand and the covered terrace

How to get to Coles Park

It doesn't matter which way you choose to get to Coles Park, you will encounter traffic as you try to navigate towards North London. Head up the A23/M23 and then anti-clockwise around the M25. Now you have to make a choice. Either head under the Thames through the Dartford Tunnel and continue around the M25 to junction 25 then head south on the A10 through Enfield until you hit the junction with the A406 North Circular Road OR M25 to junction 2, head London-bound on the A2, through the Blackwall Tunnel, A12 northwards then join the A406 at the Redbridge Roundabout and follow anti-clockwise until the junction with the A10.

Follow the A10 south towards Central London for around a mile and then take a right into White Hart Lane. The ground is on your left-hand side. There is a large car park in the ground as well as plenty of street parking if you continue down White Hart Lane and take any of the roads on the left. It is around 90 minutes from Lewes and a driving time of around 2 hours 15 minutes accounting for the poor traffic.

The nearest train station is probably White Hart Lane, which is a 20-odd minute walk. Simply head out of the station and turn left into White Hart Lane (don't get confused by the brand-spanking new Tottenham Hotspur ground). Alternatively, the nearest tube is Wood Green which is about a mile away. Exit station and take a left onto Lordship Lane, then a left into Perth Road. Follow this all the way until it meets White Hart Lane and then a right and the ground is 250 metres on the right.

Admission at Coles Park

Admission last season was £11 for adults, £5 for concessions (senior citizens and students), and accompanied under 16s admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is The Two Brewers in Scotland Green which doesn't appear to have much of a choice of beers, whilst the Victoria just a couple of doors away is not a bad option. The nearest Wetherspoons is the Spouter's Corner, on Spouter's Corner which is close to Wood Green tube station. The Bohem Tap Room is highly recommended but a good 20-minute walk from the ground in Myddleton Road, N22.

About The Len Salmon Stadium

Just when we thought we'd made our last trip for a while to Bowers & Pitsea after their relegation, up pop tenants Hashtag United. For those who haven't experienced a trip to the heart of the Essex Man, the ground has gone through a major transformation in recent years after Bowers & Pitsea's club's promotion to the Isthmian Premier League two seasons ago. The club installed a 3G pitch for the start of the aborted 2019/20 season as well as redeveloping a couple of the small stands around the pitch.

The covered terrace behind the north end of the ground is certainly unique, with a feeling that you are walking through a long corridor, with windows onto the pitch. It's great for fans to make a noise in though. It is a compact ground but has plenty of cover and more than adequate for the club, with a decent size, modern bar in the main stand and a very good food hatch who do large portions of chips for just £2.

How to get to The Len Salmon Stadium

The ground isn't easy to reach by public transport with the nearest train station, Pitsea, being a forty minute walk away. Basildon has more trains but it is 3 miles from the ground. Buses 5 and 28 both run from the station to Crown Avenue.

So driving is the best option but allow plenty of time to navigate the Dartford Tunnel.

When you are through the tunnel take the junction 30 and head East onto the A13. After 14 miles take the turn off for Pitsea.

At the roundabout take the first exit so that you pass Tesco's on your left. At the next roundabout take the third exit (Ashlyns) - go straight at the next roundabout (approx. 20 metres). Follow the road until the next roundabout and take the second exit and then take the first left into Kenneth Road. Follow the road to the end and turn right and then immediate left into the ground.

Visitors car park is at far end of clubhouse building. Access to clubhouse via pathway between clubhouse and football pitch then side door beside patio area.

Admission at The Len Salmon Stadium

Admission last season was £10 for adults, £5 for concessions (senior citizens and students), and accompanied under 12s £1 and NHS are admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

There's not a lot around the ground although The Gun on London Road, about 20 minute's walk from the ground is recommended.

How was last season?

About The Pilot Field

The words "proper Non-League ground" couldn't be more apt for the ground which is still very popular amongst stadium enthusiasts (aka "groundhoppers") for the dirt track that surrounds the pitch and its old fashioned grandstand. The main stand itself can hold up to 800 spectators, the majority of which are seated on wooden benches but it is now really showing its age. Opposite the main stand is a large grass bank, which at point spectators could have used as a vantage point, however this is now fenced off due to safety reasons.

There is covered terracing behind both goals, the more modern 'Cole Warren Stand' being constructed during the 2005/06 season at the opposite end, there is a large, covered terrace that had been erect during Hastings United time at the ground between 1948 and 1985. In one corner of the ground next to the Elphinstone terrace are the main turnstiles, club bar, toilet facilities and club shop.

Due to the increasing ground maintenance cost and ageing main stand, the club have been trying to secure permission to build a new ground in the town but are at loggerheads with the council on the plans.

How to get to The Pilot Field

From the general direction of Lewes, head west on the A27 then the A259. Proceed along Bexhill Road, turning left at a set of traffic lights onto the B2092 Harley Shute Road. Go straight ahead at a mini roundabout continue straight ahead at the main

roundabout that follows (signposted Hollington) into Ironlatch Avenue, which leads into Blackman Avenue. Follow this road through two sets of traffic lights, continuing straight ahead at the crossroads into Ashbrook Road, which leads into Old Harrow Road. At the end of the road turn right at the mini roundabout, and then turn left at the next onto the A2101 St Helens Road (The Pilot Field is signposted at this point). After approximately a mile and a quarter, take the fifth turning on the left into St Helens Park Road, which leads into Downs Road. At the end of the road, turn left and the ground is situated on your right.

There is plenty of roads within close walking distance that have no parking restrictions such as on Ochiltree Road (first right after passing the ground on your right).

If you are coming by train, then for once you don't need to head towards London. Instead catch a direct train from Lewes, journey time around 50 minutes. There is a one minute journey time if you get a train that requires a change at Hampden Park. . It's a fair distance uphill from the station so Bus 21 or 21B may be the better option. Ore is the nearest station if you are walking – allow about 20 minutes. Head down Beaconsfield Road to the roundabout and the turn right into Elphinstone Road and start to walk uphill. You will see the ground eventually on your right.

Admission at The Pilot Field

Admission last season was £12 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens, students), and accompanied under 18s are admitted free.

Fancy a beer?

There are some good pubs in Hastings with one of the best being the Anchor in George Street, whilst The Dolphin in the Old Town is also highly rated. The Telegraph rates The Crown in All Saints Street as one of the best pubs in the country. The Clown in Russel Street is worth a half at least whilst the Cutter in East Parade offers no nonsense food and drink.

About Hornchurch Stadium

It's still an athletics stadium I'm afraid, although the club are building some more spectator facilities at the club house end of the ground.

Hornchurch have called "The Stadium" home since 1953 when they moved from Upminster Park. As the club made a rapid rise through the leagues in the early 2000's bits were added to comply with various league gradings. The Riverside side of the ground is so called as the River Ingrebourne runs behind it. On this side of the ground there are three separate stands offer shelter from the elements although as they are not very steep the view isn't the best. On the East side of the ground is the Main stand, flanked by covered terracing. It is almost impossible to watch at the north end of the ground but at the other end you can watch the game from an elevated position in the bar or the terrace next door.

How to get to Hornchurch Stadium

Hornchurch is one of the few games we will travel to next season where you can take the tube to. So, for the non-drivers, head to London Victoria, grab some reading material and catch the District Line east. Upminster Bridge underground station is a few minutes away from the ground. Turn right out of the station, walk under the railway bridge and take the second right turning into Bridge Avenue. The station is in zone 6. Upminster British Rail station is the nearest mainline to the ground and a 10-minute walk. Come out of station, turn left into St Mary's Lane and then left again for Bridge Avenue. The station is also in zone 6. Remember DO NOT ALIGHT

AT HORNCHURCH...it is miles away from the ground.

If you are driving then head north up the A23/M23 and then anti-clockwise on the M25, under the Thames (don't forget to pay the toll charge online!) and then exit the motorway at junction M29 and take the left-hand slip-road off the roundabout towards London (E & C). After approx. one mile take the left-hand slip road and then at end turn left into Hall Lane.

Follow Hall Lane south, hopping over a couple of mini roundabouts, crossing the railway line before you need to turn right into St Mary's Lane (A124). Follow this road downhill and then after 600 metres, do a left into Bridge Avenue. The entrance to the ground is about 200m down this road on your left. Take your pick from the space available on the streets around here. Total distance from Lewes FC is 75 miles and it should take between 90 minutes and 2 hours each way depending on the traffic.

Admission at Hornchurch Stadium

Admission last season is £12 for adults, £7 for concessions (senior citizens and students), Under16s £3 and accompanied under 12s are admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is The Windmill which is almost opposite Bridge Avenue as you walk along the main road. It is a Greene King "family" pub so don't expect much in way of sophisticated eating and fine craft ales, but it is pleasant (and cheap enough).

The Upminster Taproom on Sunnyside Gardens is a great micro-pub, and an away fans favourite and only a five-minute walk from Upminster station. The Optimist Tavern on Hacton Lane is also recommended for a craft ale or two.

About The Camping World Stadium

Rivalries aside, the Camping World Community Stadium is impressive, and if the club manage the facilities well, it could be the compelling reason why they progress beyond Step 3. Opened before COVID it has superb facilities that can be used 7 days a week, aside from the 3G pitch. The Clubhouse is spacious and has excellent facilities, with food being served from a hatch on the side.

The Main Stand straddles the half way line and can seat 300, with an elevated situation so that fans can still pass in front without blocking the view. There are three covered, stepped terracing sections. The Octotech Stand behind the goal at the far end of the ground provides cover along around half the length of that end.

On the side opposite the Main stand, we have two covered standing sections either side of the dugouts. Again these cover about half the length of that side of the ground

With viewing is possible at the Clubhouse end of the ground, netting is erected for obvious reasons which does impede the view. This area also gets very busy around half-time and can lead to bottlenecks. Minor quibbles about an excellent ground.

How to get to The Camping World Community Stadium

It's a simple journey from Lewes to the ground – A27, A23 and the A272 towards Petersfield. At the junction with the A24 head

north and the ground is off the first roundabout just before you reach Horsham.

Parking in the Stadium Car Park will be limited on matchdays to Players, Match Officials, Home and Visiting Club Officials and Invited Guests. There are a small number of reserved spaces for drivers displaying Blue Parking Badges.

Supporters should park in Horsham Park & Ride, Worthing Road, RH13 OAR. There is no charge for parking here and stewards will be on hand to give directions to the ground which is approximately a 200 metre walk away. Whilst we strive to accommodate all supporters in this car park or close by demand can outstrip supply when a large crowd is in attendance. If there is insufficient room it may be necessary to park in the Town Centre and catch a bus or walk to the ground. There is strictly NO MATCHDAY PARKING in Worthing Road, Denne Park, Salisbury Road, Horsham Golf & Fitness or the access lane to the Stadium.

Metrobus run up to four services an hour on Route 98 to the Stadium from Roffey, Southwater and Horsham Railway and Bus Stations, with more extensive hourly services on Route 23 from Crawley and Worthing. Travel time from Horsham Bus Station is five minutes.

Admission to The Camping World Community Stadium

Admission prices for this season are £13 for Adults, £8 for Seniors, U18s and Students (proof may be required), Under16s are £2 and Under5s are admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

Horsham town centre has some excellent pubs including the Anchor Tap in East Street and the Sit and Sip in Piries Place in the pedestrian area. The Malt Shovel in Springfield Road is also worth a visit. The Club House at the ground also offers a decent selection of beers.

After flirting with the play-offs in 2021/22 under Hayden Bird, the reduction in the playing budget was clear to see in the early part of the season as they struggled to put a run of positive results together. Crowds dwindled as the K's crashed out of the cups early doors, and never climbed into the top half of the table after early November. In fact, having dropped to 18th spot with a quarter of the season to go, they never moved from that position. Relegation was a real threat until Simon Lane came in with a handful of games to go, which saw them pick up the necessary points to survive, perhaps against the odds.

Lane has his work cut out this season against a backdrop of supporter discontent, no permanent home and one of the smallest budgets in the league.

When did we last meet Kingstonian?

The Rooks recorded a comfortable double over Kingstonian last season, including a rare win away. The two sides met in sub-zero conditions at Imperial Fields in December, with the Rooks winning 3-1 although the score

of a goal from Jacob Bancroft and all of a sudden their tails were up. It took an injury time goal from Tyrique Hyde, his first for the club to calm the nerves and give Lewes all three points.

In the return fixture at The Pan in February it was a much easier affair with a first half effort from Joe Taylor giving the Rooks a half-time lead. Two second half goals from Ryan Gondoh and Will Salmon rounded off a good afternoon in front of 750 fans.

About Imperial Fields

The stadium itself is a recent development, the club having moved in 2002 from a decrepit all-wooden facility at Sandy Lane in Tooting, which had been declared a fire hazard but is now looking very tired.

The ground is certainly unique. One large main stand that straddles the centre of the pitch and two raised terraces behind the goal with a little roof on top. Views are excellent from most parts of the ground. On the far side of the ground there is a two-step terrace that sits in the shade. Picnic benches next to the main stand complete the unique look and feel of the ground. The clubhouse is accessible through the main stand as well as from the car park. Often there are private events going on in the function room adjacent to the pitch when games are going on, which is a little bizarre.

How to get to Imperial Fields

Most of us will come via the M25 junction 8, heading north on the A217 Brighton Road.

Follow this north around the edge of Sutton town centre until you reach the Rose Hill roundabout. Take the third exist, still on the A217 and the ground is around a mile up this road on the right hand side opposite the BP garage. There is a decent size car park at the ground, alternatively it is street parking which may incur a parking ticket. Total journey time for the 53 mile journey from Lewes is around 1 hour 15 minutes.

The nearest station is actually the tram stop, Mitcham Station which links to the rail network at Wimbledon (6 stops), Mitcham (1 Stop), Croydon West and East (20-25 mins), plus others further east. Imperial Fields is 5 mins walk. Turn left on the road bridge station exit and keep walking. Morden Tube Station isn't too far away either - Morden station, on the Northern Line, is the nearest (about 20-25 mins) or buses 201, 118. The stations are in Zone 4.

Admission at Imperial Fields

Admission last season was £12 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens and carers), £6 for students and Under18s free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is the Crown Inn which is on London Road just fifty yards up from the Tram stop. Further up London Road is the White Hart (conflicting reports whether this is still open) but apart from that, pubs are actually quite thin on the ground close to the stadium. If you are coming on the tram from East Croydon you may want to have a beer around there or even head south towards Sutton which isn't that far away.

About Hartsdown Park

Hartsdown Park is still a work in progress. I know I also wrote that five years ago, and in every preview since but it is...so they tell us. This is partly due to the fact that the last decade some of the ground (including the Main Stand and terracing) have been demolished in preparation for the building of new structures, but due to off the field changes in the boom and bust economy of Non-League football and the revolving door of the boardrooms, the promised new stands or developments, include a hotel and new changing rooms, have failed to materialise.

At the Hartsdown Road End is the only structure remaining from the "old ground". This is quite unusual looking, as although it has a few steps of open terrace at the front, behind it has an enclosed covered terrace, which is sandwiched between the Clubhouse bar and other club buildings. If you stand on this terrace then to your left are a couple of temporary stands. They are situated either side of the half way and are all seated and covered. However, they are quite small being only four rows deep. The opposite side is dominated by portacabin-type structures that are located in the middle with some flat standing areas on either side. These contain the team dressing rooms and the team dugouts are located out front. The remaining Tivoli Park End (known locally as the 'Coffin End'), has a very small, covered terrace that is located directly behind the goal.

How to get to Hartsdown Park

A23/M23 then M25 anti-clockwise. At junction 5, head down the M26 and then join the M20. At junction 7 head onto the A249 towards Sittingbourne then join the M2 at junction 5 heading towards

Canterbury/Dover. On reaching the end of the M2 take the A299 towards Margate.

Stay on the A299 for sixteen miles, until you reach a roundabout which is the junction with the A28. At the roundabout take the second exit onto the A28 continuing towards
Margate. After passing a BP garage on your right and then the Hussar pub, also on the right, you will pass through a set of traffic lights. Take the second right onto the George V Avenue. At the end of the road you will reach a T-Junction where you turn right into Hartsdown Road. The entrance to the ground is further down on the left. There is plenty of surrounding street parking available. Journey time for the 88-mile trip is two hours.

Margate station is located just under a mile from Hartsdown Park. It is served by trains from London St Pancras International, London Charing Cross and a slower route from London Victoria. As you come out of the main station entrance, bear right and walk up the station approach. At the roundabout turn right into All Saints Avenue and go under the railway bridge. Turn left into Tivoli Park Avenue and cross the road to walk alongside the park. After 350 yards turn right down a surfaced footpath. The path leads directly to the turnstiles.

Admission at Hartsdown Park

Admission last season was £12 for adults, £9 for concessions (senior citizens), £5 for Under18s and accompanied under 11's are admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

There's a decent sized Clubhouse bar at the ground. Margate Town Centre is around a 15-minute walk away, where there are plenty of pubs to be found. On the harbour arm is the, aptly named Harbour Arm micropub which is small but a decent pub when the sun is shining. Northern Belle pub on Mansion Street has been listed in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide. The Xylo Brewing taproom on Marine Drive is most definitely worth a visit. Also, of note is the Lifeboat pub on Market Street, which also has a wide range of real ales and ciders.



About The Lantern Stadium

The Lantern Stadium is well-appointed and pleasant ground to visit. The main stand is a four-row affair that runs around half the way down one side of the pitch, resplendent in the club's blue and red colours. Behind the stand is a decent-sized clubhouse, upgraded in the summer with an outside marque which also has screens up to watch Sky Sports. There's a small, covered stand in between the two dugouts on the far side of the ground whilst behind one goal is another small, covered area. An interesting bit of trivia for you – the turnstiles came from the Old Wembley Stadium.

How to get to The Lantern Stadium

The ground is located close to junction 24 of the M25, meaning you have a choice as to whether to head clockwise or anti-clockwise when you reach junction 7 from heading up to M23. In terms of distance, it is within a mile either way (98/99 miles from Lewes and around 2 hours) so it will depend purely on the traffic – perhaps go clockwise on the way there, anti-clockwise on the way back so that

you can claim to have done a complete circuit in a day!

From the M25 junction 24 head north on Southgate Road until the junction with the A1000 and take a right into the High Street. After the BP garage on the left, take the next left in The Walk. The entrance to the ground is 100 yards on the right-hand side. It is street parking for everyone.

The nearest railway station is Potters Bar which is on the line from Kings Cross (around 17 minutes journey) or Moorgate (around 35 mins). From the station the ground is a 10-minute walk away – The Walk is opposite the station and simply head eastwards, taking the path on the left after 500 metres to the ground.

Admission at The Lantern Stadium

Admission last season is £12 for adults, £8 for concessions (senior citizens and students), under 16s are admitted free of charge with an adult.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is The Admiral Byng in Darkes Lane which is a decent sized Wetherspoons. The Old Manor is an attractive looking pub almost next door to the station and is definitely worth a visit for their good selection of beers. There is a Harvester (The Oakmere) in the High Street about a five-minute walk from the ground.



About The Enclosed Ground

The Enclosed Ground is one of those grounds that looks good in the summer sunshine, with the rolling South Downs on one side, but come a wet night in February, can feel very exposed. It is only half a mile from the sea front, with the sea visible as you head down the Avenue from the racecourse at the top of the hill.

The ground is only three-sided with the Downs-side not being accessible for spectators. The Main Stand is a small covered seated stand, which is set back from the pitch and runs for around a quarter of the length of the pitch straddling the half way line. On the South side of this stand are some small buildings which house the club house and dressing rooms.

To keep pace with the Club's rise up the League Pyramid, before they fell back down, the capacity has been boosted by erecting temporary stands at either end of the ground. At the North End there are two banks of open seating, which were once in place at the Withdean Stadium whilst at the opposite end where are temporary stands, in four sections that are at different heights to one another.

How to get to The Enclosed Ground

It will be the shortest away trip for most Rooks fans this season and easy to do by car. Head west on the A27 take the slip road sign posted Falmer/Rottingdean (B2123). Continue straight towards Rottingdean passing the Amex stadium on your right.

On reach a set of traffic lights which is the Woodingdean Junction, turn right by the Downs Hotel, towards the City Centre/Racecourse. At the next traffic lights turn left into Wilson Avenue (signposted East

Brighton Park). After passing the entrance to the Stanley Leisure Centre, continue further down the hill and then take a left into a narrow road (signposted East Brighton Park/Camping). Follow the narrow road round, passing an entrance to a caravan park and the ground entrance, is around to the right. There is a car park at the ground that holds 100 cars and the entrance road up to the ground is quite narrow, so it may be an idea to find one street parking on the residential streets off Wilson Avenue and walk over to the ground.

Brighton Central Railway Station is situated around two and half miles away from the ground. Either get a taxi or bus up to the ground. To take a bus; then from the Stance B stop at the railway station, take the Brighton and Hove Bus Company No 7 (towards Brighton Marina) or 27 (towards Saltdean) to Roedean Road (ask the driver to drop you off on this road near the Marina). After being dropped off, walk up Roedean Road to the traffic lights (keeping the gas pylon on your right) and turn left into Wilson Avenue. Then take the next right into a narrow road (signposted East Brighton Park/Camping). Follow the narrow road round, passing an entrance to a caravan park and the ground entrance, is around to the right.

Admission at The Enclosed Ground

Admission last season was £10 for adults, £5 for concessions (senior citizens, students, NHS) and accompanied under 10s are admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

There is a small club house at the ground whilst around a 5-minute walk away is the Brighton Brewery taproom. Also, on the sea front is the Marina where the Master Mariner is known for its ales. You are only a short bus ride from the centre of Brighton where there are pubs a-plenty.



About The Maurice Rebak Stadium

The Maurice Rebak Stadium, named after one of the founders of the club is a pretty decent ground in pleasant surroundings. The main stand, notable for its art-deco curves and glass holds around 400 and is raised above ground level so that you get a nice, elevated view of the game. In front of is some uncovered terracing, backed by a hedge.

On the opposite side of the pitch is a very narrow covered terrace which allows away fans to huddle together a create a bit of a noise. There is a decent sized covered terrace to the left, behind the goal but at the other end there is very little room at the other end and it is just hard standing.

The bar is a decent size and his hidden under the main stand, with food served to the left of the entrance.

How to get to The Maurice Rebak Stadium

The ground is actually relatively straight forward to find – the issue is the traffic! Head up the A23/M23 then head into London on the A2 and pass under the Blackwall Tunnel. Follow the A12 until it reaches the A406 North Circular at The Redbridge Roundabout and follow this west0wards (anti-clockwise). Stay on the A406 until you pass by the BP garage where the road reduces to two lanes. At the junction with the A1000 (East Finchley) leave the road. At the end of the slip road turn left at the lights. Go straight over the next set of lights, then after 100m pass through another

set of lights. Then at the next set of lights turn right into Summers Lane. The ground is a few hundred metres down on the right-hand side. Do NOT park in the rugby club next door as you may get locked in, instead use street parking. Distance from Lewes is 94 miles and should take around 2 hours to drive.

The nearest station is New Southgate in Travelcard Zone 4, approximately 1.5 miles from the ground.

At the top of the station steps take the righthand gangway which brings you onto Station Road. Head left up Station Road towards bus stop. The regular 382 service to Millbrook Park goes via Summers Lane and takes about 5-10 minutes. You will need to alight at the Woodgrange Avenue stop, which is a short walk to the ground.

The nearest Underground station is West Finchley Station (Northern Line - High Barnet branch).

The station is a 10/15-minute walk away from the Ground. Alternatively go to East Finchley Station and get a 263 bus heading North towards Barnet. Get off at the bus stop just after Summers Lane traffic lights.

Admission at The Maurice Rebak Stadium Admission last season was £12 for adults, £6 for concessions (senior citizens and students),

Under18s are admitted free of charge.

Fancy a beer?

The nearest pub to the ground is the Elephant Inn on the corner of Ballards Lane and Hutton Grove (on the walk from West Finchley tube) which has some decent beers and a Thai restaurant upstairs. The Tally Ho is your nearest Wetherspoons, located as Finchley High Road splits just north of the ground but I'd imagine a fair few fans will head for the Bohemia in High Road, known for its excellent selection of craft beers.

The Fenix Trophy

For the first time in our history, Lewes Football Club will be taking part in an international tournament in the 2023/24 season, having been invited to take part in the third edition of the Fenix Trophy, joining FC United of Manchester as England's representative.

The FENIX TROPHY is a ground-breaking international sporting event, promoted by the Milan-based football club Brera FC. Its inaugural staging has taken place between September 2021 and June 2022 between 8 non-professional clubs (each one paired with a charity partner), chosen for their exceptional social, historical and cultural distinctiveness. The competition has received UEFA's approval.

In the first edition, the teams represented 7 European countries: Italy, Spain, Poland, Germany, Netherlands, United Kingdom, and Czech Republic. The 8 clubs involved were famous for a varied number of reasons: clubs rebuilt and run by the fans, clubs featuring significant social and cultural projects, clubs with extraordinary communication skills, etc. In short, a real European network among "cult" non-professional clubs. The competition was won by FC United of Manchester

The second edition, began in October 2022, saw a different format and an increased number of clubs and represented countries. 9 clubs from Italy, Spain, Poland, Belgium, Netherlands, United Kingdom, Denmark, Serbia, and Czech Republic faced each other in the FENIX Trophy 2022/2023, with Skjold from Denmark being the eventual winners.

The competition's meaning goes beyond the simple football aspect. The FENIX Trophy is an experience of sporting exchange, meant to highlight best practices within non-professional football: sporting conduct, bonds with the local community, sustainability, use of technologies, and friendship among clubs.

The trophy's symbol is a phoenix, the mythological bird that regenerates from its predecessor's ashes: it stands as a metaphor and a wish for the rebirth of new football models. FENIX, however, also has meaning as an acronym.

FRIENDLY — The distinctive character of the competition is based on creating a friendly environment for clubs, players, and supporters. This marks a significant difference from professional tournaments, where the clubs are set in arbitrary opposition to each other.

EUROPEAN — The tournament aims to develop a cooperative network between some of the most important cities in Europe: Milan, Rome, Manchester, Amsterdam, Hamburg, Warsaw, Prague and Valencia. Tournament travel is designed to increase a sense of European belonging among participants and supporters.

NON-PROFESSIONAL — The idea of the focus on amateur clubs is to draw attention to alternative football models. The purpose is to show that such alternatives, full as they are of fans' passion, can provide great sporting and social involvement.

INNOVATIVE — Such an event is unprecedented in the non-professional football world. An additional innovation is to bring clubs together based on affinity (in this case, being iconic clubs) rather than simply on football ranking (although the clubs are quite similar in their footballing level).

XENIAL — From the Ancient Greek xènos, the word indicates an attitude of hospitality towards strangers, maintaining a mutual respect of cultural differences. In each match, in fact, the away club

is fully hosted by the home team. The competition intends to make this attitude the shared sentiment of the tournament – and expand this idea outwards.

We will play in a group of three teams, playing each side home and away between November and April. The group winner, along with the three other group-topping sides, will progress to a finals weekend in May 2024, playing a semi-final and then either in a $3/4^{th}$ Play-Off or the Final itself. In the 2022/23 season, the final was played at the San Siro, home of AC and Inter Milan.





How was last season?

The club finished fourth in the East Flanders league, qualifying for the play-offs, eventually losing out to Fenixx BeigHum 2-0. Only seven points separated seven teams in the end, with KSK holding off fierce competition on the last day of the season. They only took five points from their last five games.

About The Freethiel Stadium

The stadium is the traditional home ground of SK Beveren and hosted many famous games including European Cup ties and a European Cup Winners Cup semi-final against Barcelona back in 1979 in front of a sell-out 25,000, having beaten Inter Milan in the previous round.

The club do not play all their games here which is the permanent home ground of SK Beveren or Waasland-Beveren (not to be confused), often having to play league games on the astro turf surface next door, which has a capacity of around 1,000 but it is hoped for our Fenix Trophy tie it will be hosted in the main stadium that has two big, covered stands, decked out in blue and yellow seats on either side of the pitch, one of which has executive boxes at the back and terracing at either end, one end of which is covered. Views are superb from whatever vantage point you decide to take.

How to get to The Freethiel Stadium

Beveren is a two hour drive from Calais and the Eurotunnel terminal at Sandgatte. If this is your journey of choice then follow signs to the A16 from the terminal and head east in the direction of Dunkirque and Belgium. After 30 or so miles you'll enter Belgium and the road becomes the E40.

Follow for 55 miles until the Zwijnaarde junction where you need to follow signs for E17 Antwerpen. After 30 miles take exit 15a for Haasdonk unto the N485 towards Steendorp. After 1 mile turn left onto Heirstraat, then right onto W. van Doornyckstraat, left onto Zandstrat and left into Klapperstraat, left into Meerminnendam for the ground. There's plenty of parking there or on the surrounding streets.

If you are heading to Beveren by train then you'll most probably take the Eurostar to Brussels Midi. Walk to Brussels-Zuid and catch a train towards Anvers, changing at Antwerpen-Berchem (40 mins) for a train to Beveren (14 mins). The ground is a 1.5 mile walk away.

Antwerp Airport is the nearest airport which has regular flights from London City with Luxair. Brussels airport is a 40 minute drive away and has more services from London.

Admission at Freethiel Stadium

Admission last season was €7 for Adults, 12-16 year olds €2 and under12s were admitted free of charge.

Staying in Beveren

Beveren has a couple of B & Bs not too far away from the ground such as the Koehuis Bosdam and Notarishuis but I would expect most to head to the bright lights of Antwerp 12 miles away where there are plenty of hotels on offer.

Fancy a beer?

You really need a guide to where to drink in Belgium? Basically, anywhere and everywhere! Whilst there's not many bars close to the ground, many fans will probably divert into Antwerp where there are hundreds of options. There is the De Kruk on Glazenleeuwstraat that is a 10 minute walk from the ground that is recommended. At the ground you need to buy tokens for €2 each to pay for food and drink.

About Bjølsen Kunstgress

FC Oslo play around 3 miles north of the city centre, not too far from the national stadium, Ulleval. Facilities are modest at the sports ground which has a 3G pitch but not much cover for fans. However, the hospitality is top notch in the club house.

How to get to Bjølsen Kunstgress

From Oslo Central Station you can take either bus 34 for 15 minutes to Tåson alle then walk 100 metres to the ground. Buses 54 and 57 also pass close by to the ground.

The nearest airport is Oslo Airport at Gardermoen, which is about 20 miles north east of the city centre. British Airways and SAS fly from London Heathrow, Norwegian fly from London Gatwick multiple times a day. The airport has a express train link to the city centre – it is fast, but it is expensive!

Ryanair fly to Oslo Sandefjord, or Torp airport which is 70 miles south west of Oslo and only linked by a very slow bus.
